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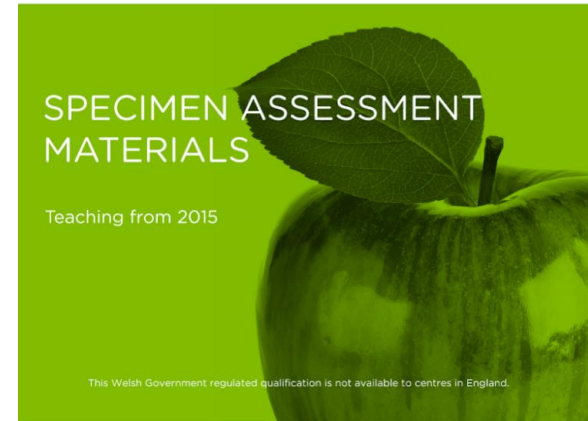

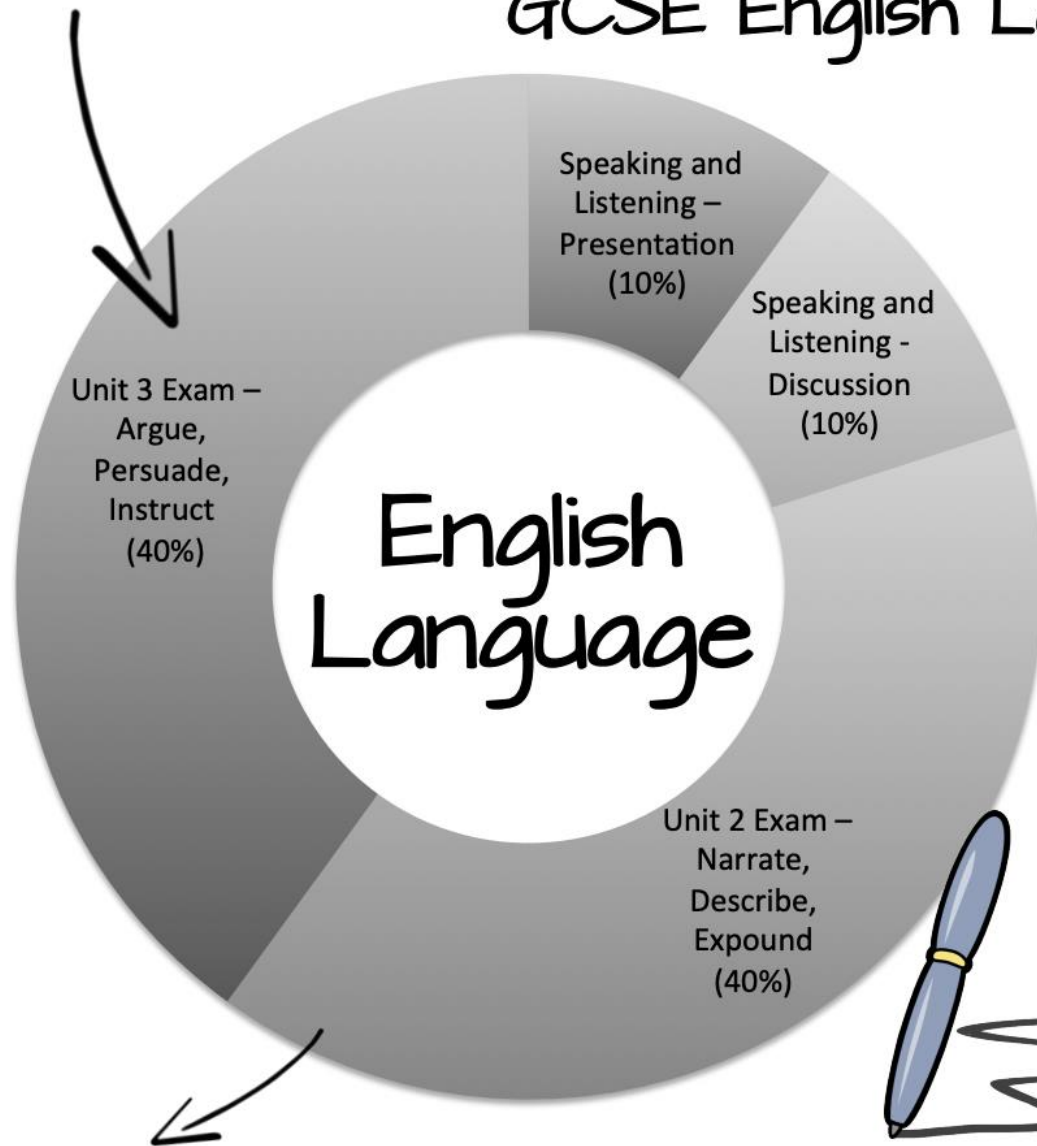
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Overview

Coursework

There is **no written coursework** element of the qualification.

Unit 1 comprises two pieces of speaking and listening coursework:

- Individual research presentation
- Group discussion

The first exam is called Unit 2. Its focus is *narrate, describe, expound*.

- ***Reading section***

- Series of short texts, [1] to [10] mark questions

- ***Editing & Proofreading tasks***

- Series of short exercises

- ***Writing section***

- Either a narrative/descriptive tasks or an expository essay

Unit 3 is the second exam. Its focus is ***argue, persuade, instruct.***

- ***Reading section***
 - Series of short texts, [1] to [10] mark questions
- ***Writing section***
 - Two responses, from either argue, persuade or instruct

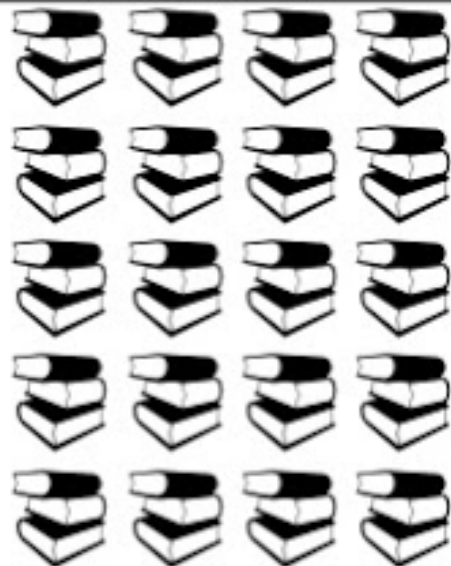
WHY READ 20 MINUTES AT HOME?

❖ Student A reads an average of 20 minutes per day.

❖ 3,600 minutes per school year.

❖ 1,800,000 words per year.

❖ Scores in the 90th percentile on standardized tests.



❖ Student B reads an average of 5 minutes per day.

❖ 900 minutes per school year.

❖ 282,000 words per year.

❖ Scores in the 50th percentile on standardized tests.



❖ Student C reads an average of 1 minute per day

❖ 180 minutes per school year

❖ 8,000 words per year.

❖ Scores in the 10th percentile on standardized tests.



If they start reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6th grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 schooldays, and Student C will have read for 3.
